


1917 Bye Election Commemoration Event

Kilkenny County Council hosted an event on 12th August commemorating the election of W.T. Cosgrave at the 1917 Bye Election in Kilkenny city.

The day commenced with a re-enactment of the balloting, followed by the arrival of "Countess Markievicz" to Kilkenny and a parade through the City. Hustings speeches from Magennis, Markievicz, De Valera, and W.T. Cosgrave were delivered at Grace's Castle in the presence of members of the Cosgrave and Magennis families. The Defence Forces displayed the Michael Collins armoured car ARR2, otherwise known as Sliabh na mBan, and members of the Cosgrave family unveiled a commemorative plaque.

The day's events finished with some music and historical context in the Medieval Mile Museum on Saturday evening, with keynote speaker Dr. Ciara Meehan. Lt Stephen O'Brien from James Stephens Barracks spoke on the local scene in Kilkenny at the time, and music for the event was supplied by Drops of Green.

TOURISM & MARKETING

Measure 1 of the 2017 Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme

Kilkenny County Council was awarded €36,610 for projects under Measure 1 of the 2017 Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme.

• Measure 1: Small maintenance/promotion of existing infrastructure (maximum grant €10,000).

The Scheme is part of the Government's Action Plan for Rural Development and provides funding for the development of new outdoor recreational infrastructure and the maintenance, enhancement and promotion of existing outdoor recreational infrastructure in Ireland.

Recreational tourism is a growing sector in Ireland's tourism offering. We have seen an

increase in the number of Irish and overseas visitors enjoying the many greenways, blueways and walking trails which have been developed around the country in recent years.

The scheme will be run by Local Authorities and State Agencies. 80% of total project costs will be funded with the balance to be provided from Local Authority or other sources.

Maximum Grant is $\notin 10,000$. Funding has been allocated to the following:

Minister Michael Ring, has said he will make further announcements under the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme in the Autumn, and we will await final decisions on Measures 2 for 3 applications.

Following applications, judging visits, destination assessments and an online voting campaign, Kilkenny took third place ahead of Kinsale and West Waterford.



Medieval Mile Brochure

Staff are in the process of developing a new brochure for the Medieval Mile with 'Designworks', who did the original branding for Kilkenny's Medieval Mile project. This will be multilingual and available circa the end of September.

Kilkenny LEO CEDRA Funding

Kilkenny County Council received €40K in CEDRA funding under the Agri-Food Tourism

initiative. This will fund a Pop-Up Bistro, exhibition space at the National Design and Craft Fair, Yulefest's Artisan Food Fair and a suite of new marketing material which will enhance the #tastekilkenny initiative.

Kilkenny Leader Project Volunteer Expo

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Deputy John Paul Phelan, T.D. Minister of State at the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government with special responsibility for Local Government and Electoral Reform launched the Local Enterprise Office (LEO) Kilkenny's Autumn Training Schedule on Friday 8th September in the Abbey Business Centre. With 20 training programmes along with 3 free seminars and National's Women Enterprise Day Conference, there is plenty on offer for entrepreneurs and small businesses. LEO Kilkenny has developed a range of courses and workshops aimed at improving the knowledge and skills of small business ownermanagers, so their businesses have an increased opportunity for success.

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ROADS:

<u>N24 Piltown Fiddown By-Pass - Tower Road</u> Junction & Inkbottle Junction Safety Measures

Additional interim safety measure recommendations at Tower Road Junction, arising out of the Preliminary Feasibility Study are currently being implemented. The works include the provision of additional signage, roadmarking alternations along with the construction of hardstanding areas to facilitate speed enforcement. It is expected that these works will be completed over the coming weeks.

<u>N24 Piltown Fiddown By-Pass - Tower Road</u> Overbridge and Ink-bottle Link Road

A Road Safety Impact Assessment and Options recommendation was submitted to Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) at the end of July. TII approval was recently obtained to engage the services of an engineering consultant to advance the planning and design stage of the Tower Road Overbridge and Ink-bottle Link Road. A design brief is being prepared and it is anticipated that a consultancy firm will be appointed over the coming months utilising the TII Framework for Technical Consultancy Services.

N76 Callan Road Realignment Scheme

The contract for the N76 Callan Road Realignment Scheme was awarded to SIAC Construction Limited on the 21st December 2016. This scheme extends for 4.38km's from the N76 Callan Road Roundabout, on the Ring Road, to the Brownstown Junction. The Scheme provides for the introduction of on-line footpaths/cycle-tracks and public lighting from the Ring Road to Tennypark Cross and off-line road realignment between Tennypark Cross and Brownstown Junction.

The works are progressing well with the earthworks and drainage generally completed. The kerbing has been completed for the first kilometre and the road resurfaced. At Shellumsrath the kerbing has been partially completed on the east side and works are underway to install footpath/cycle track, public lighting and drainage on the west side.

On the offline realignment section, construction of the road pavement has commenced and will continue during September. The Cattle Underpass at Brownstown Junction has been completed and road reconstruction/resurfacing is nearing completion in this area.

The Contractor and site staff continue to liaise with property owners and accommodation works are now substantially completed in most cases. The local road from Tennypark Cross to Bamford Cross will remain closed until mid October. Traffic is being managed satisfactorily with minimal delays and road users are utilising the alternative routes.

The expected works completion date is Quarter 1 of 2018.

<u>Western Environs Road - Construction (First</u> <u>Phase Infrastructure)</u>

Following on from a successful application for funding under the DHPCLG Rebuilding Ireland Programme via the Local Infrastructure Housing Activation Fund, the Department notified the Council in March 2017 that a grant of €5.07 million would be made available to part fund this Scheme. A draft Grant Agreement document was issued to the Department in June and it is anticipated that same will be officially signed in September 2017. This agreement sets-out the criteria to allow the successful drawdown of funding.

Design works are well advanced and the target objective remains to advertise the tenders towards the end of this year. A Property Consultant was also engaged in June 2017 to assist with the acquisition of lands subject to the confirmed C.P.O. In September, Michael Murphy was appointed Project





Manager for the Western Environs Infrastructure project.

In May 2017 Irish Water (IW) advised the Council that it will dedicate \in 50 million nationally in its 2017-2021 Investment Programme to extend water service networks to strategic development areas / sites that will yield a significant number of housing units in settlements with the greatest need. IW also confirmed that the Western Environs Scheme was one of 15 Initial Candidate Sites in the country deemed eligible to benefit from this investment programme. Over the next number of months the Council will work with IW to ensure the timely delivery of this necessary infrastructure which is critical to the development of the Western Environs Scheme.

CLÁR Programme

In May 2017 an application for funding was submitted to The Department of Arts, Heritage, Regional, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs under the CLÁR Programe (Ceantair Laga Árd-Riachtanais). As in 2016 the projects put forward were to target small infrastructural works in areas that have experienced significant depopulation in the past. Funding applications could be made under the following three categories:

- a) Measure 1: Support for Schools/Community Safety Measures (Up to 90% CLÁR funding);
- b) School/Community Play Area (Up to 90% CLÁR funding);
- c) Targeted Community Infrastructure Needs (Up to 85% CLÁR funding).

In total the Council submitted 14 individual projects under the three categories and were advised recently by the Department that the following projects will be funded:-

All 2016 projects are currently either completed or under construction with all works due to be finished by October 2017.

<u>N24 Granny & New Aglish Pavement</u> <u>Improvement Scheme</u>

The above Scheme consists of a 2 km overlay / inlay, the provision of a dedicated right-turn lane at both the Tinlough Junction (Thatch Bar) and Portnahully Junction (Croke's Shop), improvements to the Aglish Junction at Roadstone, roadmarking and signage renewal and accommodation works.

Tender documents for the above scheme were advertised on the 2^{nd} June 2017. Construction commenced on Monday September 2^{nd} . The contract period for this Scheme is estimated at six weeks.





<u>N78 Ballycomy to Castlecomer Pavement</u> <u>Improvement Scheme</u>

The above Scheme consists of a 1.4 km overlay / inlay, roadmarking and signage renewal and accommodation works.

Tender documents for the above scheme were advertised on the 10th July 2017. Construction commenced on Monday September 11th. The contract period for this Scheme is estimated at five weeks.

<u>Future National Road Pavement Improvement</u> <u>Schemes</u>

Kilkenny received a funding allocation of \notin 99,200 from Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) to advance the design and preparation of contract documents for the following two pavement improvement Schemes:

- N25 Graiguenakill (New Ross By-pass tie-in) to Gaulstown, length 3.60km plus an additional 0.53km section from Luffany to the Rhu Glen, combined length 4.13km.
- N78 Castlecomer Bridge to Coolbaun South and Coolbaun North to Crettyard, length 6.73km.

A topographical survey and pavement testing of both roads was recently completed. A consultancy firm was engaged by the Council to provide technical services to advance the design and tender documentation.

Subject to the necessary TII design and funding approvals, it is anticipated that tenders for each of the above Schemes will be advertised towards the end of this year and the contracts awarded with a view to commencing works in Quarter 2 2018.

HOUSING:

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Housing Capital Programme

11 Units at Togher Way, Urlingford

Cllr. Mary Hilda Cavanagh opened 11 houses at Togher Way, Urlingford on the 7th July 2017. Families have moved into their homes and are settling in well.

33 Units at Donaguile, Castlecomer

A Public Consultation Evening was held in Castlecomer Library on the 29th August 2017 regarding the 33 Units planned for Donaguile.

The approved number of housing applicants at 28th June is 1,237. This number does not include those households on a transfer list or in accommodation provided under RAS or HAP.

Forward Planning:

- The Draft Ferrybank/Belview LAP was placed on public display for 8 weeks between Friday the 9th June and 4th August 2017. A total of 41 submissions were received. The Chief Executive's report on the submissions received has been circulated to the members for consideration at the September meeting.
- Variation No. 3 to the Kilkenny City and Environs Development Plan was adopted by the Council on the 17th July 2017. The variation is in support of the Local Infrastructure Housing Activation Fund (LIHAF) and seeks to maximise the benefits of the infrastructure being delivered through the fund and secure the delivery of two new schools and new housing.
- The Urban Design Framework for the Hebron Road has been published and the public consultation closes on Friday 15th September. Documents on display can be viewed online at http://consult.kilkenny.ie/.





- The draft of the Castlecomer Local Area Plan is almost complete and will be published in September along with the statutory environmental assessments.
- A proposed variation to the Kilkenny City & Environs Development Plan (Variation 4) and a proposed variation (Variation 2) to the County Development Plan commences public display on the 15th September. This is to facilitate the implementation of the vacant sites levy.
- It is expected that the proposed National Planning Framework will be published by the Government in early October 2017 for public consultation.

ENVIRONMENT

Kilkenny Tidy Towns Forum

Kilkenny Tidy Towns Forum visited Carlow to meet representatives from Clonegal and Ballon tidy towns in August. The "Nature's Way Trail" and their award winning community shop, Siopa Glas in Ballon was also visited. The tour was facilitated by the Environment Departments of Carlow and Kilkenny County Councils. All tidy towns volunteers look forward to the national tidy town results which are due to be announced on the 25th of September.



Councils Environment Education Programme

All primary schools have been invited to participate in the environment education programme which offers over 40 interactive workshops covering a host of different environmental themes. Workshops are sponsored through LA 21 Environment Partnership Fund and the Waste Prevention Programme and will take place during the 1st and 2nd school terms. The annual green school information evening takes place on the 25th of September for all participating green schools.

Crayfish Plague update

Following reports of dead crayfish in the River Barrow, Waterways Ireland and NPWS engaged in an awareness campaign and proceeded to identify measures required to contain the outbreak. Signage has been erected in various locations including Thomastown, Inistioge, Bennettsbridge and Kilkenny City.

All available networks are being used to notify river users of Crayfish plague and to advise on biosecurity measures and disinfection protocol. KCC has issued press releases to local newspapers and radio and will continue to notify river users of requirements over the coming months.

The situation is ongoing and the next meeting with NPWS, KKCC and LAWCO is scheduled for 19/9/2017.

Water Framework Directive

Following a national bid process Tipperary and Kilkenny County Councils were successful in their application for the establishment and management of the Water Framework Directive Tier 3b Project. Both local authorities working together with a Project Team will be responsible for the implementation of the National River Basin Management Plan throughout the country. This is an ambitious national project and will result in the development of significant expertise in the area of river water quality and community engagement throughout the Country. We look forward to the challenges the project will bring and the beneficial outcomes to the waterways and river users of Kilkenny and further afield.

To date this year, Kilkenny County Council has served 4 no. fire safety notices and 1 no. fire safety closure notice. This was the second highest county in the country (Dublin being the highest) in the serving of Fire Safety Notices. RTE's Morning Ireland carried out a survey on all Local Authorities and reviewed results on National Radio.



New Graiguenamanagh Fire Station Works to be completed 2018 <u>Fire Appliance Joint Procurement Programme</u> 2018 – 2020.

Kilkenny County Council has been approved under the above programme for one Class B Fire Appliance which will be procured for the Urlingford Fire Service.

Fire Safety – Multi Storey Buildings

1. Circular Letter Fire 04-17 requested that all Local Authorities review their Multi storey social housing buildings to ensure that they are meeting their statutory obligations in regards to Fire Safety.

The review concentrates specifically on common areas with a primary focus on ensuring that all early warning systems including fire alarm and detection system, emergency lighting are in place and fully functional.

A) Kilkenny County Council owns only one such premises at Gaol Crescent, Gaol Road, Kilkenny. This building is a two storey building with 2no apartments on each floor. The building complies with Fire Safety requirements.

- B) Kilkenny County Council was also requested to review multi storey housing buildings, fully tenanted by social housing tenants on foot of agreements with Approved Housing Bodies. There are two buildings in this category (both at Carroll's Yard, Logan Square, Thomastown). These in the process of a buildings are Regularisation Fire Safety Certificate process.
- C) Kilkenny County Council was also requested to write to the relevant owners and management companies where social housing is provided within a privately owned multi storey development reminding them of their fire safety obligations. In this regard the Fire Authority has issued over 70 letters covering over 200 social housing units across approximately 50 buildings.
- 2. Circular Letter Fire 05-17 requested that all Local Authorities should identify buildings of more than six storeys or more than 18m in height fitted with external cladding or rain screen cladding systems with or without insulation. The Fire Authority has identified 9 buildings that may meet the above criteria. 9 letters have been issued requesting owners to carry out a fire safety assessment and to revert to the Fire Authority in matters pertaining to compliance.

The expenditure by service division for the seven months to the end of July 2017 is set out in table 1. Total Expenditure for the period was \notin 43.6m compared with the annual budget of \notin 70.16m.

The bank overdraft facility has not been utilized during the seven months to the end of July.

The total Commercial Rates collected is up by 2 per cent compared with the seven months to July 2016. This would indicate that more account holders are availing of the early payment grant scheme agreed in the last two Budgets.

As part of the national revaluation programme of commercial properties the Valuation Office issued final valuation certificates to property owners on September 7th. The new Valuation List will be published by the Valuation Office on 15th September 2017. Rate payers who are dissatisfied with the valuation fixed on the property have a right to appeal to the Valuation Tribunal, an independent body established to determine such appeals. Appeals to the Valuation Tribunal must be made within 28 days of the publication of the list but no later than 12th October 2017.

In advance of preparing the 2018 Statutory Budget for Kilkenny Council the Elected Members are required to make a decision before the end of September 2017 on the issue of varying the basic rate of Local Property Tax (LPT) up or down by a maximum of +/-15%. This is the first stage in the annual budgeting process. The impact of the maximum variation is +/- \in 1.1m. The value of every % variation is +/- \in 74k. The LPT allocation has already been confirmed by the DHPCLG at \in 10.67m which means there is no increase in funding available for 2018. An additional funding requirement of \in 1.8m for 2018 has been identified. In the absence of any increase in available funding a reduction in expenditure will have to be considered. A full report on the matter will be circulated to the Members in advance of the Council Meeting.
