

Full Steam Ahead for South East Greenway

Kilkenny County Council is collaborating with its neighbouring Councils of Waterford and Wexford to develop the South East Greenway. This is a game changing 24km off-road cycling and walking trail through South Kilkenny, which will also connect Waterford City to New Ross.

Planning permission and funding is firmly in place so now it is full steam ahead for the construction of the South East Greenway.

The route follows the abandoned railway line and is designed to be used by as many people as possible, including walkers of all ages, wheelchair users and cyclists of all abilities. The Greenway will support the people of Kilkenny to engage in healthy outdoor activity and will provide an alternative transport choice for commuters and school children.


Investing in our outdoor spaces

uring 2020, Kilkenny County Council developed plans to deliver continued capital investment in our public spaces throughout the City and County. Two successful grant applications were made, to Fáilte Ireland and to the Department of Arts, Tourism, Culture, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media, to enhance two key outdoor spaces in the City for citizens and visitors alike to enjoy. These resulted in the Council securing €900,000 in grants for key projects.

Despite the challenges we faced with the Covid-19 pandemic, many of our projects were advanced during 2021. Good progress was made on the Abbey Quarter site. The Riverside Park and Skateboard park opened in May. The renovation of the Tea Houses at Bateman Quay has Horse Barrack Lane and Brewhouse Square are nearing completion, with plans advancing to deliver the next Phase of the development. It was great to see the completion of new roads in the Breaghagh Valley, which will open up a new neighbourhood in the City for significant housing development. The early delivery of new homes is essential for the social and economic wellbeing of Kilkenny and our

Thanks to the dedication of our staff we have progressed projects across the County to enhance our rural communities. These include the Kilkenny Greenway, mobility improvement works under Active Travel Programme,

We have all experienced a challenging projects under Town and Village Renewal Scheme and CLÁR Scheme. We continued to deliver new homes under our Housing Capital Programme for households in need of social housing and supports. Works completed include the access road at the Barrow Valley Activity Hub Graiguenamanagh which welcomed many visitors during the Summer. The refurbished Tea Rooms at Woodstock and Parks and Playgrounds across the County experienced increased usage as we all enjoyed our local amenities.

> Over the last 12 months, the Council has supported local businesses and communities as Kilkenny reopened for business and visitors. Funding provided through Government streams allowed us to provide infrastructure to facilitate outdoor dining areas in Kilkenny City and in our rural towns and villages. These spaces allowed people to begin to meet, connect and enjoy outdoor dining with friends and extended family. In addition, we delivered many supports to local communities through the Community Wellbeing Programme which supported your physical and mental wellbeing during the restrictions.

In partnership with the Elected Representatives, the staff of Kilkenny County Council will continue to plan for the future development of the City and County while facing and dealing with the current challenges

In June, Cllr. Fidelis Doherty was elected Cathaoirleach, or First Citizen, of Kilkenny County Council. It is just the sixth time a woman has worn the chain of office here in Kilkenny, in

"It is such a great privilege to be elected to the position of Cathaoirleach for this term. It is an honour to have this opportunity to represent the people of Kilkenny, and I promise to do my best in the role. That's a promise I made at the start of this journey and one that I intend to

There is no typical day as Cathaoirleach: every day brings new experiences and challenges, and one can expect the unexpected. I have an early start every day to catch up on emails, take calls from my constituents, prepare for meetings and there is always lots of reading.

As Cathaoirleach, I also have the privilege of attending lots of events across the County, and it is very important that I prepare for these by having my speech ready in advance and being on time for everything.

I absolutely love my job as an elected representative on Kilkenny County Council and the opportunities it gives me to help people and my community. I have always had a great community spirit. The time I spent volunteering with Citizens Information helped me understand how daunting some issues can be for people and how difficult it can be to know where to start. That's why I believe the role of Councillors is so important, as we are often the first point of information for many people.

I am honoured to be just the sixth woman in over 120 years to wear the Cathaoirleach's chain. My advice to anyone curious about a career in politics is that if you are interested – go for it!

My greatest motivation is the love I have for my work. The many years I have worked as a Councillor have taught me a lot, but my greatest piece of advice would be to learn how to actively listen to others, and to understand another person's point of view.

Having a support network around you is also so important. While it is great to be confident and able to mind yourself, it is important to know that there are people around you too.

It is important to give yourself the time and space to think and plan ahead, and to have a good balance between work and personal life. I am very busy but to relax, I enjoy painting, gardening, and watching my favourite Netflix shows with my family.

I am especially delighted to see the resumption of GAA fixtures and some community events which we sorely missed during Covid-19 lockdowns.

I think it is important that as restrictions ease, we learn to talk to each other again. I am certainly looking forward to meeting people again after a long time and popping down to my local for a chat with friends and neighbours.

I thank the people of Kilkenny for their resilience other frontline workers who kept the show on the road and the shelves filled throughout the crisis. Without doubt, it was a shocking time, but everyone adjusted.

I want to acknowledge the tremendous work of our local communities and the different groups that were set up throughout Kilkenny to provide support to their communities. Simple actions to help vulnerable people, such as fetching the shopping for an elderly neighbour, made all the difference. As difficult as this time has been, it has no doubt brought out the best in our people.

I am very grateful for the support I enjoy in doing this job - from my family, neighbours, and community, as well as from my fellow Elected Members and the Executive and Staff at Kilkenny County Council.

Providing a place to call 'Home'

hrough our Housing Delivery Team, we are working hard on one of the most important activities we do as a Council – providing safe and secure places that families can call 'home'.

In 2020, we provided 183 homes at developments including Breagagh Place in Piltown, Nunico Road in Kilkenny City and Hoban Park in Callan.

We are improving the energy efficiency of our housing stock, with Hoban Park, Callan being the first Near Zero Energy development in the entire country, ensuring all homes here are highly energy efficient.

We are also making more houses accessible for people with disabilities and are working to provide a greater variety of house type through our building

Through our current housing plans, we aim to deliver 37 high quality housing projects, which means more than 400 homes will be provided to people across the

Housing delivery is supported by the Government's Housing For All Programme, with an investment of more than €100 million in Kilkenny County.

Pardon the weeds – we're feeding the bees

//ilkenny County Council's Parks Department is aiming to reduce the frequency of mowing to support our pollinators. Reducing mowing allows wildflowers to bloom and provides an important food source for bees and other pollinators.

There are now several areas where we will reduce mowing to encourage the growth of wildflowers and hedgerows. We are working closely with Keep Kilkenny Beautiful, Tidy Towns Groups and Residents Association to implement this change in how we manage our green spaces.

Flowers we might usually consider weeds such as dandelions and clovers in lawns and road verges, and willow, blackthorn and hazel in hedgerows are so important. These flowering plants provide essential early season food for hungry bees emerging from hibernation.

Kilkenny County Council is a supporter of the All-Ireland Pollinator Plan for 2021-2025, a new five-year road map that aims to help bees, other pollinating insects and our wider biodiversity. Kilkenny County Council is looking forward to continuing to work in partnership with communities and Tidy Towns Groups to encourage and support a better way of managing our whole landscape to support our struggling biodiversity.

Abbey Quarter transforming the City

le are continuing to work hard to deliver the highly anticipated 'Abbey Quarter'.

The conversion of this former industrial site into a mixed-use development will transform the City Centre and provide an inclusive place for all our communities to live, work and play. It will connect the former industrial site to the City Centre, creating welcome spaces for pedestrians and cyclists.

Work on the site is making good progress. The longto the public in May this year, providing a riverside walk from the historic Tea Houses at Bateman Quay to Greensbridge. The skatepark has already proved hugely popular, with skaters of all ages and abilities now using the park to practice and show off their skills.

Works on converting the Tea Houses at Bateman Quay and developing the Brewhouse for office use continues. This phase also includes the upgrade of Horse Barrack Lane and new Brewhouse Square. These works are expected to be finished by the end of 2021 and will add valuable public spaces to this extensive site.

The conversion of the old Mayfair Ballroom into a new City library will commence in October this year. The urban park and street around St. Francis Abbey will commence in 2022, opening up the remainder of the former Brewery site for the development of new buildings. These works will provide visitor access to St. Francis Abbey and the City

side Garden at Abbey Quarter, Kilkenny City, officially opened this year

into a modern public space.



Protecting our heritage

■he 2021 Community Monuments Fund will invest €60,000 in support for conservation plan for St. Francis Abbey, St. Francis Well and Evans Turret in the Abbey Quarter as well as St. Lachtain's Church in Freshford. The Kilkenny County Council Heritage Officer administers the Community Monuments Fund, coordinated nationally by the National Monuments

Proposed works include the future conservation, maintenance, and presentation of the iconic structures in the Abbey Quarter. St. Lachtain's Church is set to receive a renewable energy heating system and to improve the interpretive facilities here which tell the story of the ancient site and church. This will support the programme of events planned for 2022 to commemorate the 1,400th anniversary

In September, KCLR aired a special feature on the Abbey Quarter Conservation Plan in its series "The History Fix". Full Steam Ahead for South East Greenway

The South East Greenway will include a number of stunning sites, including the 680-metre long Mountelliot Tunnel, the Victorian Red Bridge over the Barrow, Ballinlaw Castle and a spectacular view of the Rose Kennedy Fitzgerald Bridge.

We expect the Greenway to be fully completed and open to the public by August 2023.

Further funding is already in place to connect the South East Greenway to the Waterford Greenway, providing a continuous link between Dungarvan and New Ross.

new 3-year Litter Management Plan has been adopted by the Elected Members of Kilkenny County Council. The ambitious plan, which is intended to help combat the increasing number of litter complaints being received by the Council for investigation, involves a wide spectrum of measures including upgrading and expanding the Council's network of bring centres, continuing the roads sweeping programme and investigating illegal dumping.

The Council will further support the Green School Programme, Tidy Town Groups and the installation of new litter bins as part of wider Town and Village Renewal Schemes.

The plan noted that cigarette litter, dog fouling and sweet and food packaging and paper were the main types of litter found throughout County Kilkenny and that pedestrians and passing motorists were the County's main sources of litter.

In other litter news, we introduced musical bins to Kilkenny City for a short time during the summer months! These bins were transformed to entertain and reward those who do the right thing by giving them a musical treat when they put their litter in the

Millions in Funding for Active Travel

ilkenny County Council is making walking and cycling attractive, safe and accessible to everyone, connecting communities and encouraging healthier forms of travel.

We are working on several projects to make our roads and footpaths safer for pedestrians and cyclists and to improve connectivity in our urban areas.

Some of the projects we are working on include improving public lighting on footpaths and cycle ways, new footpaths and pedestrian crossings and safe school zones.

As well as supporting active and healthy travel options, switching to active travel will also reduce Kilkenny's dependency on cars, which will help us to tackle Climate Change

Through the National Transport Authority and the Department of Transport, we have received over €4.3 million for projects to support Active Travel across the County. A number of these projects are already underway and will be complete by the end of this year.



Grants for 181 local groups

ouncillors in Kilkenny County Council have approved €140,000 in grants for 181 groups, including Resident Associations, Tidy Towns Groups and other Community Organisations across Co. Kilkenny from the 2021 Amenity Grant fund.

The Amenity Grant Scheme is designed to support local communities to carry out projects including the upkeep, maintenance and enjoyment of public amenities, landscaping and development of open spaces, and small-scale improvement works. Groups across our County carry out outstanding work every year to improve our local environment and we are proud to support the variety of works carried out through the Amenity Grant Scheme.

Teatime in Woodstock

ilkenny County Council is delighted to have officially reopened the much-loved Tea Room Conservatory in Woodstock Gardens and Arboretum in July of this year. Overseen by Cathaoirleach Cllr. Fidelis Doherty, the opening unveiled the spectacular mural capturing Woodstock garden in its prime.

The Tea Room had been closed to the public while the Parks Department of the Council undertook a number of significant enhancements to the structure. Some of the improvements carried out included sealing of the curved glass roof and repainting the ironwork. Other works

included the installation of Victorian style lighting and planting along with a new stone patio for outdoor dining.

These works build on several improvements made to Woodstock Gardens and Arboretum over the past number of years, including playground enhancements, a pergola seating area and information plaques. By the end of 2021, Kilkenny County Council will also have restored over six kilometres of Victorian Pathways in Woodstock

Managing Kilkenny's roads

n 2021, over €16 million was allocated towards road improvements, restoration and maintenance in the City and County for local and regional road networks. This will enable works to be carried out across the City and County and allows for some long-awaited projects including bridge rehabilitation and safety improvement works

Kilkenny County Council is continuing to work in close cooperation with other Local Authorities, Transport Infrastructure Ireland and the public to deliver new roads projects and upgrades that will benefit the County by making our roads safer, shortening journey times,

alleviating congestion and providing better connections between key locations.

In 2021, the public were given the opportunity to provide feedback on plans for the N24 Waterford to Cahir route and rerouting of the N25, completing the connection between Waterford City and Glenmore/New Ross Bypass. Progression of these projects is subject to approval and provision of Government funding.

Road improvements will benefit all residents and visitors to Kilkenny, boosting tourism and making our road network safer for all users.



Minister for Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media, Catherine Martin, T.D. and Fáilte Ireland recently announced funding of €649,000 for a permanent Outdoor Dining facility to be developed in Kilkenny City. The Market Square in the Market Yard outdoor dining area was developed with the aid of national funding at the height of the pandemic last year. This will be further enhanced with weatherproofing, redesign of paving and additional improvements to the seating area to provide a permanent outdoor dining area in the City. Developing this area as a permanent Outdoor Dining Facility will make it suitable for use in a wider range of weather conditions for longer periods of the year, helping businesses towards sustainable recovery. Consultants have recently been appointed to prepare designs for Market Square and Kieran Street for consideration, that will be subject to public consultation in due course.

Outdoor Seating and Accessories Scheme for Businesses

Throughout 2021, Kilkenny County Council continued to administer the Outdoor Seating and Accessories scheme funded by Fáilte Ireland. The objective of this scheme is to provide individual businesses in the tourism and hospitality sector with opportunities for outdoor dining and to increase their capacity, while restrictions on indoor dining remain. Grants have been made available to businesses. June 2021 saw the re-opening of many businesses and wonderful outdoor seating has sprung up throughout the City and

June 2020 as an emergency response to the drastic decline in Tourism business due to Covid-19. Fáilte Ireland and Kilkenny County Council engaged with stakeholders from local agencies, local businesses and tourist attractions to inform the Council's response to the pandemic.



Public art policy

ouncillors have approved a new policy that will inform future public artworks to be purchased. The policy ensures that there is a clear process in place when it comes to deciding on future art works to be funded through the Council.

Stakeholders from across the County's community and arts sectors will be invited to participate, including artists, art organisations and local communities, as well as staff from within Kilkenny County Council and Councillors.

Public art is incredibly important to our communities, adding value to the culture, economy, vitality and the aesthetic of our County. An iconic and wellloved piece of artwork contributes to a community's identity, fosters community pride and enhances our quality of life.

This policy will inform how we use the 'Percent for Arts' Scheme, which makes funding available exclusively for public art. It is used to fund temporary and permanent arts projects and covers a range of artforms. The scheme supports the commissioning of artists across all contemporary art forms including Visual Art, Opera, Traditional Art and Circus/Street



his project is a partnership between Kilkenny Civic Trust and Kilkenny County Council. The outdoor Catwalk Art Trail was designed to support and bring local businesses, arts and the community together, and attract visitors to Kilkenny. It provides a new and exciting activity and walking route around the City for families and people of all ages to enjoy.

The model - Kilkenny's most famous cat

The model is a 5ft tall fibreglass resin sculpture based on The Secret of Kells character, Pangur Bán, created by fourtime Academy Award®, Golden Globe®, BAFTA and Emmy nominated Kilkenny-based animation studio, Cartoon

Art and Artists

Most of the work has been undertaken by local artists. Along the Catwalk of 21 sculptures there are a number of fantastic themes including; an age-friendly cat, a cat designed by a local youth group, a Cartoon Saloon designed cat and a hurling & camogie themed cat signed by both Kilkenny Teams.

Keen to engage with the local community during lockdown earlier this year, the project team offered an outlet for various groups to immerse themselves in a unique project.

- Local Youth Group, Ossory Youth came on board and immersed themselves in the design and creation of a young peoples' cat in collaboration with artist, Joanne
- Cartoon Saloon themselves got their own wonderfully talented illustrators to work on a Pangur Bán model and produced the Catwalk Cat.
- We also put out a call for emerging artists to come on board and exciting emerging artist Graham Carew has produced a delightful cat for the trail.

Have your say

our feedback is highly valued - it helps us better understand what our communities want so that we can set the right priorities and future directions as a Council. We're a listening Council and often need to ask you for your views and what you think about future developments. We are continuing to establish better ways for you to have your say on the way we work and the projects we carry out.

Sometimes the way we engage with you is set by legislation, and there are many steps to follow. Sometimes we can choose. Even if consultation is not required, we may decide that some other form of engagement is helpful and appropriate. There is a wide range of tools for engagement. Differing levels of engagement may be required during different stages of decision-making on an issue or a project. Levels of engagement may also be different for different stakeholders.

The Council engages with the community on many levels. This can be by way of a statutory consultation process or to communicate or seek feedback in a more informal way. "Statutory" means processes and timelines are defined in law, and this includes planning and compulsory purchase processes.

Examples of communications and engagement channels used by the Council are:

Website | Public notices | Newspaper | Media releases | Social media | Radio | Face-to-face presentations | Community Newsletter and Annual Newsletter.

Public Consultation

The County Council engages in a number of different types of public consultation. The Council uses an innovative online consultation portal, consult.kilkenny.ie, where you can view all the current consultation processes in one place. You can make a submission directly online, and you can see what other submissions have been made.

If you register for a consult.kilkenny.ie account, you can also choose to be kept informed of all the relevant consultations that matter to you. At the end of the consultation, a report is published on the consult.kilkenny.ie site, outlining what decisions have been made and why.

Public consultation processes can be divided into statutory consultation processes and non-statutory processes. Three of the most common statutory processes are Part 8s, Development Plan and Local Area Plan processes.

There are also other processes, not defined in law, such as Mobility Management Plans and Masterplans.

What is a Part 8?

Most developments by a local authority itself are subject to a public consultation process as set out in the Planning & Development Regulations, 2001 - 2012. This procedure is commonly referred to as a 'Part 8'. Notice of a Part 8 proposal is given in the press, a site notice is erected, and Part 8s are also made available on the consult.kilkenny website. Following consideration of any submissions or observations, the Chief Executive presents a report to the Elected Members of the Council. The issues raised during the consultation process are a vital input, as they provide valuable local insight to inform the decision-making process. The Elected Members decide on Part 8s, this is a called a reserved function as it is reserved to the Elected Members to decide.

Kilkenny has always had a reputation for being a centre for creativity. MADE in Kilkenny has worked for nearly a decade to bring together the amazing array of talent in Kilkenny and to promote the region as the number one destination for authentic Irish craft of exceptional quality.

We are delighted to see Kilkenny recognised on the international stage for its artistic talent. Kilkenny is

also well known for creative areas including fine-art, animation and its many music, film, comedy and food festivals. These awards are so important to boost our national and international reputation and encourage participation in the arts.

The title was awarded to Kilkenny by the World Crafts Council, a non-governmental organisation aiming to promote crafts as a vital part of cultural, social, and economic life through a global network of members and affiliates.

ilkenny County Council is delighted to announce that funding has been approved for two new libraries for

Thomastown is set to benefit from funding of €2.5 million for a new library building and community facilities for the town. Additionally, the iconic Mayfair building in the Abbey Quarter of Kilkenny is to be transformed into the new City library with €4.9 m of funding secured. Our libraries are one of the most important services we deliver for you as a Council and the new facilities will be designed to be as open and accessible as possible



There's more to our libraries than reading

espite our doors being closed for much of the year, your local library team never stopped. hout 2021, we became flexible to continue delivering library services including Contact and Collect and Book and Browse. Our Door-to-Door delivery service to the over 65s also remains popular, with over 6,000 items delivered across the County. Our Door-to-Door service users also received our 'Art of Writing' stationary kits, to encourage people to stay connected through the art of letter writing.

We have also seen a huge increase in the popularity of the library's online services including a range of eBooks, eMagazines and other services. A new library app was also launched in 2021, to provide an easy way for people to access online library services 24/7. Another digital initiative saw the library's Age-Friendly Digital Ambassador Programme launched, where library staff provided 1-1 remote training to older people on how to use our online

Library staff continued to prepare content including online story times for kids, craft workshops, book recommendations and even book clubs. The 'Dial a



Story' freephone number was also available for people to enjoy stories by local authors from the Loughboy and Thomastown Creative Writing Groups. Nearly 500 younger library members aged 3-5 received our 'Sending a Smile' postcard kit to design and send cards to their friends and

830 growing kits were distributed throughout Kilkenny under the Grow it Forward initiative in partnership with Grow It Yourself. The free growing kits contained 5 packs of seeds –

those who received the kits were asked to "Grow it Forward" y giving some seeds, seedlings or produce to another 10 people. The response was phenomenal as so many people have embraced the opportunity to get involved in growing their own vegetables at home.

We are delighted for our doors to be open again and to be welcoming our members back to their local library. We continued to improve our reading resources and selection of books. Call into your local public library to see all that is on

likenny's Civil Defence played a crucial role in the emergency response to the Covid-19 pandemic over the past 18 months. The Civil Defence is a volunteer service provided by Kilkenny County Council. We caught up with Katherine Peacock, Civil Defence Officer for Kilkenny, who recently won the Irish Pensions and Finance Public Service Unsung Hero Award.

"Typically, I'll start the day by responding to emails and then I'd usually have something to organise, be that training, maintenance or planning for an event. I'm in and out of the unit so much throughout the day, there's always someone to meet or something to organise. It's really varied. I might have something planned for my day and in the middle of it get an emergency call out, so you really don't know what to

Covid-19 changed the service provided by Kilkenny Civil

"We went from training and supporting planned events every week to supporting the HSE and Kilkenny County Council in their response to the pandemic. This included bringing people for tests or transferring Covid-19 patients to special HSE units. On top of that we delivered care packages and we ran a Covid-19 helpline. Sometimes we felt a bit like Ghostbusters on the helpline, so many calls came through that we didn't know what to do with! People needed lightbulbs changed or tiles had blown off their roof. But the point wasn't whether we could solve the issue, it was to be the eyes on the ground, to organise the support that they needed and just to reassure people.

"We've built amazing relationships with other organisations like the HSE, the Gardaí, Community Care services, Children's services and nursing homes. It was a great opportunity to demonstrate what we can do, and hopefully continue to work collaboratively to serve the community in

Katherine wants to thank everyone who has supported Kilkenny Civil Defence over the past 18 months, particularly the many committed volunteers.



"Kilkenny's Civil Defence volunteers are amazing. They volunteered over 4,000 hours during the height of the Covid-19 period. At a time when everyone was staying at home to protect themselves, the Civil Defence volunteers stepped up and put themselves on the front line. That was incredible. Our volunteers were always here when we

Volunteering gives people a sense of purpose and selfconfidence. For Katherine the most rewarding aspect of her job, leading the Civil Defence, is seeing the volunteers develop and grow.

"It's nice to know that you're helping people and that you've made a difference. We met so many vulnerable members of the community during Covid. We called to check in on them and we still look out for many of them today. The relationships started out of necessity, because they needed a service from us, but they developed into so much more."

Kilkenny Civil Defence has a strong base of volunteers, but there's always turn-over. Katherine hopes to grow the County's volunteer base further.

"If anyone is interested in joining the Civil Defence, I encourage them to contact me directly," she says. "It's quite a long process that requires a lot of time and training before

you can get started so definitely talk to us first, because it's a really big commitment."

Over the coming years Katherine hopes to introduce new initiatives to the service, like drones and more water-based disciplines. Kilkenny Civil Defence lost a lot of its equipment in a fire a number of years ago, so it has been rebuilding the

Ultimately, Katherine says she hopes that Kilkenny Civil Defence remains an integral and valued service in the

Enhancing Kilkenny's fire and rescue service

he Kilkenny County Council Fire Service is continuing to grow and improve, with investment of more than €8 million planned for new fire stations and an additional fire engine.

A new fire station is to be constructed in Urlingford, incorporating state of the art new facilities and training capabilities. This new station will replace the current facility which has been in operation since the 1970s and is limited in its ability to cope with the demands of a modern Fire and Rescue service.

With plans for Urlingford Station progressing, the process of selecting a site for the development of a new fire station in Kilkenny City will progress, to ensure the provision of a cutting-edge service for the City and its environs long into the future.

Acting on climate change

/ilkenny County Council is committed to acting on Climate Change to support our people, ecosystems, environment and infrastructure.

We have upgraded approximately 40% of the almost 11,000 public lights across Kilkenny to more energy efficient LED lights and we intend to continue with these upgrades to make sure our county is shining bright in a greener fashion!

We are also undertaking a deep retrofit of our older Council buildings to improve their energy efficiency and installing solar panels on Council buildings to produce renewable

In addition to reducing our carbon footprint, we are working on an extensive tree planting programme to help capture and remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. We are also developing biodiversity friendly open spaces and

parks, such as the development of a new Countryside & Biodiversity park at the disused landfill at Dunmore.

Another impact of climate change that many people in our County are unfortunately too familiar with is increased flooding. To reduce the risk that flooding poses to our county we are working to deliver a number of flood relief schemes, funded by the Office of Public Works, in our villages and

We also want to help people to make behavioural changes and live more sustainable lifestyles. Home Energy Saving Kits are available to homeowners through our library branches, and we are also supporting several educational initiatives to promote reduction of waste, particularly food waste, and to encourage recycling and reduction of single

Relieving flooding

Flood Relief Capital Office was set up in 2019 by Kilkenny County Council, in collaboration vith the OPW as the funding authority. A total of €29.8 million was approved for Kilkenny to implement six Schemes across the County over ten years. Towns earmarked for Flood Relief Schemes include Graiguenamanagh, Ballyhale, Freshford, Thomastown, Inistioge and Piltown.

The project aims to identify, design, and build Flood Relief Schemes; that are technically, socially, environmentally, and economically acceptable; to alleviate flood risks to the communities of Graiguenamanagh, Tinnahinch and

Work on the first Schemes commenced in March 2020 which sees over €9 million being invested in a Flood Relief Scheme in Graiguenamanagh and €430,000 in Ballyhale.

For Ballyhale, consultants have undertaken a series of studies to establish environmental and flood conditions. Their reports have determined the impact of flooding throughout the area, identified areas at risk and proposed potential suitable flood alleviation measures. These measures have been assessed in more detail in terms of cost, feasibility & environmental impact and an emerging preferred option has been identified. Public Consultation on the option selection was held online in August (see www.consult.kilkenny.ie.) The Final Stage 1 Report will be completed later this year (2021). Once complete and approved a planning application will be made to An Bord

In March 2020, consultants were appointed to develop a Flood Relief Scheme for Graiguenamanagh & Tinnahinch. The project area includes the River Barrow, Duiske and tributaries. Kilkenny County Council is the lead authority for the project across Counties Kilkenny and Carlow.

Work completed to date includes environmental, underwater archaeology, topographical, and other surveys The technically feasible options for the Scheme are being assessed and ranked to identify a preferred option. Site Investigation works are required to determine ground conditions for potential flood defence measures, and these are expected to be completed early in 2022. Potential flood mitigation measures will then be developed and presented for public consultation. Stage 1 of the Project is currently projected to be completed in April 2022. Stage 2 will involve making a planning application to An Bord Pleanála.



Kilkenny County Council supported the One Million Stars project to raise awareness of Gender Based Violence. This is the first project of its kind in Ireland that is helping to raise vital funds for the Amber Women's Refuge to provide a range of supports to people suffering violence in the home. This playground was developed by the local community with assistance from the Parks Department and with funding from the Council's Community and Cultural Capital Facilities Scheme

partnership approach between the local community and Kilkenny County Council resulted in a fantastic new recreational space in the centre of Thomastown for all the community to

Minister for Justice, Social Protection, Community and Rural Development and the Islands, Heather Humphreys T.D., and the Cathaoirleach of Kilkenny County Council, Cllr. Fidelis Doherty, opened the new outdoor multipurpose amenity in Thomastown.

The project involved enhancing the previously underutilised and derelict amenity area behind the town's Community

Centre. It included resurfacing existing run-down basketball and tennis courts, removing old fencing, landscaping and building an amphitheatre and seated area. LED lighting was installed over the courts and an outdoor accessible shelter was added to provide seating and picnic benches.

This wonderful new recreation park and outdoor leisure facility in the centre of Thomastown provides opportunities for active living and recreation for adults and older children and complements the existing children's playground. A hub of activity, the new outdoor space is being enjoyed by teenagers, children and adults alike to meet-up outdoors and play tennis, basketball and badminton.

The project was developed by Kilkenny County Council in partnership with recently established local volunteer group: Thomastown Community Recreational Area Group (TCRAG) and the Thomastown Community Centre. This state-of-the-art amenity secured €100.000 under the 2020 Town & Village Renewal Scheme. Kilkenny County Council delivered the Project and contributed funding towards the facility, with Kilkenny Leader Partnership.
