#### **ROADS**

#### **National Roads**

TII announced in December 2019 an allocation of € 11,426,503 for the 2020 programme of works in County Kilkenny. The funding includes for the advancement of a number of strategic road projects such as the

- o N24 Waterford to Cahir scheme
- o N25 Waterford to Glenmore scheme

Funding to advance the following minor and safety schemes:

- o N24 Tower Road Safety Scheme
- o N24 Carrick Road Scheme
- o N77 from Ballyragget Village to the Ballynaslee Improvement Scheme.



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The N76 Callan Road will see further improvements with approximately €5.1 million allocated for pavement improvements on sections from Brownstown to Callan and an allocation has been received of €700k towards pavement improvements on the N77 Oldtown to Ballyragget.

#### Other Projects:

#### Kilkenny Western Environs Phase 1 Infrastructure

Construction of the scheme commenced in March 2019. Works are progressing well and are on programme to finish by the planned completion date of September 2020. The Circular Road is currently closed to facilitate construction of a new bridge over the River Breagagh. These works are expected to be completed in March 2020, allowing the Circular Road to reopen.

#### Castlecomer Pedestrian Bridge

Kilkenny County Council applied for planning permission to An Bord Pleanala for the Castlecomer Pedestrian Bridge on the 9<sup>th</sup> August 2019. An oral hearing date is set for the 30<sup>th</sup> January 2020.

#### **Forward Planning**

#### Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy

The Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy for the Southern Region (RSES) was approved by the Regional Assembly on 29<sup>th</sup> November, 2019. The RSES will become operable from the 31<sup>st</sup> January 2020.

#### City & County Development Plan:

The formal process of progressing the City and County Development Plan will recommence in early 2020. Work on various plans and strategies required for the new plan continues. Masterplans have commenced for Loughmacask & Fairgreen and lands at St. Canice's. The public consultation meeting for Loughmacask is scheduled for January 20th 2020 and others will follow in early to mid-February.

Work on the Retail Strategy, Housing Needs Demands Assessment, Renewable Energy Strategy, Strategic Environmental Assessment, Appropriate Assessment and other constituents of the new City and County Development Plan continues in the background.

#### Graiguenamanagh Local Area Plan

The joint Local Area Plan for Graiguenamanagh and Tinnahinch continues. The preparation of a report on the pre-draft consultation is nearing completion and it is anticipated that a draft plan will be published in early February 2020. At that stage the statutory public consultation will commence for a minimum period of 6 weeks

#### Vacant Sites

A total of 87 sites were assessed for inclusion on the Register in late 2019, and a total of 17 sites were added to the Register for 2020. Notices were issued to the relevant landowners in late December, giving notice that their sites are being included on the Register. The owners have 28 days to appeal to An Bord Pleanála.



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There are currently 44 sites on the Vacant Sites Register. A total of 27 of these are now liable for the 7% levy. Payment demands will issue for these 27 sites over the coming weeks. Two sites have had their levy discharged to date.

An Bord Pleanála recently made their first decision in relation to the payment demands issued in January 2019, and upheld our payment demand.

The number of cancelled entries due to site activation or improvement now stands at a total of 11 sites.

#### Conservation

Conservation Grants applications for 2020 are currently being received.

#### **Built Heritage Investment Scheme 2020**

Nationwide funding of €2,500,000 has been made available as part of the Built Heritage Investment Scheme 2020 by the Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht. The Scheme provides funding to owners to carry out conservation works of protected structures, proposed protected structures and structures in Architectural Conservation Areas, or within the Amenity of a National Monument. The Scheme provides funding ranging from €2,500 to €15,000, with grant allocations not exceeding 50% of the overall cost of each conservation project.

#### **Historic Structures Fund 2020**

As part of the *Investing in our Culture*, *Language and Heritage 2018 – 2027*, the Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht announced the Historic Structures Fund for 2020 with a total (countrywide) fund available of €1,824,000. This Historic Structures Fund aims to support the conservation and enhancement of historic structures and buildings for the benefit of communities and the public. The Historic Structures Fund has two Streams:

Stream 1 offers grants from €15,000 up to €50,000 and is aimed at essential repairs and smaller

capital works for the refurbishment and conservation of heritage structures.

**Stream 2** offers a small number of grants from €50,000 up to €200,000 for larger enhancement, refurbishment or reuse projects involving heritage structures, where a clear community or public benefit has been demonstrated.

Closing date for both of the above Grant Schemes is Thursday 31st January, 2020.

#### **ENVIRONMENT**

# Dog Licence Inspection Unit yields very positive results

The roll out of the Dog Licence Inspection Unit in mid October 2019 has seen a significant increase in the number of dog licences purchased in the final quarter of 2019. In total 1,527 licences were purchased during the period from the 15<sup>th</sup> October to the 31<sup>st</sup> December 2019 compared to just 451 for the same period in 2018. This brings the total number of dog licences purchased in Kilkenny during 2019 to 5,472 compared to 4,630 in 2018. It is anticipated that compliance with this legal requirement will increase during 2020 as our Inspectors continue with door to door inspections.

Dog licences are available for purchase at local Post Offices or on line at *licences.ie* for a fee of €20 per dog or a lifetime dog licence is also available for €140. Failure to produce a valid licence for your dog could result in an on the spot fine of €100 and/or prosecution with fines up to €1,270.



2019 was a very busy year in the Carlow Kilkenny Dog Shelter in Paulstown. In total 517 dogs were surrendered or picked up as strays by the Dog Wardens. We are pleased to confirm of these 517 dogs 322 animals were rehomed and 192 animals reclaimed. Regrettably 3 animals had to be put to sleep during the year following advice from the





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vet due to health issues or aggressive nature of the dog.

Works also commenced in 2019 to enhance staff accommodation facilities at the shelter and also to provide a small visitors area. It is anticipated that when works are completed the facility will provide for a better visitor experience for members of the public considering offering a dog at the shelter a new home.



# Continued growth in usage of Recycling Bring Centres

During 2019, three new Bring Centres were provided at the following locations: Urlingford, The Rower and Belmont, Ferrybank, bringing the total number of sites up to 46 across the City and County. Signage upgrades were carried-out to 8 sites. Under the Anti-Dumping Initiative Programme, a number of new mobile CCTV cameras were procured for use at Bring Centres.

Recycling activity at the Council's Bring Centres was high throughout 2019 with 1,881 tonnes collected, consisting of 1,775 tonnes of glass and 106 tonnes of aluminium and steel. This represents an increase in the tonnage collected for recycling of 131 tonnes (or 7.5%) on 2018 and 228 tonnes (or 14%) on 2017. Loughboy Shopping Centre in Kilkenny City remains the busiest facility with 130 tonnes collected for recycling during 2019.

# Official open of the Harristown Pocket Park in Graiguenamanagh.

In Graiguenamanagh, on Thursday the 19<sup>th</sup> of December, local people gathered for the official opening of the town's newest public space 'The

Harristown Pocket Park' by the Cathaoirleach of Kilkenny County Council, Cllr Peter 'Chap' Cleere.

The new Pocket Park which adjoins Fairview Housing Estate and the Borris Road was delivered under the Department of Communication, Climate Action and Environment 2019 Anti-Dumping Initiative Programme.

The works consisted of both hard and soft landscaping which incorporated age friendly seating. The focus of the planting is pollinator friendly and a wildflower area will be planted in Spring to compliment the works already completed to-date.

#### **Enforcement Activity 2019**

There was a significant increase in waste enforcement activity across a broad spectrum of waste activities from the unauthorised disposal of household waste, C&D and other material waste, unauthorised end of life vehicle (ELV) facilities, non-compliant Waste Collection Permits etc. The Environment Enforcement Team accompanied by An Garda Siochána on a number of major Operations throughout the year. Due to the success of same we will continue to do so throughout 2020. The Bar Chart below illustrates the increase in the number of FPN's (Fixed Penalty Notices) issued under Sections 14 and 55 of the Waste Management Act over the last 4 years.





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Furthermore, under the Litter Pollution Act, 118 FPNs were issued for various offences including discarding cigarette butts from car windows and littering in a public place. The number of fines issued in 2019 represents a significant increase on the fines issued in 2018 (+22%) and 2017 (+145%) and reflects the Council's zero tolerance when it comes to illegal waste disposal and fly tipping.

#### **Historic Landfill Remediation Projects 2019**

Under the 2019 Historic Landfill Remediation Programme the site in Gowran was remediated and the Ballyragget site was almost completed and it is anticipated to be finished in Q 1 2020. In December 2019 the Council drew down funding of €1.55 million from the Department of Communication, Climate Action and Environment to fund these projects.

# Kilkenny's Green Schools Programme & School Supports



Kilkenny County Council continues to support An Taisce's Green School Programme. There is one school being assessed for their first award

this month and there will be approximately 25 schools due for a renewal assessment before the end of March. These will be conducted by the

Council's Environmental Awareness Officer (EAO).

The EAO continues to assist schools and conducted one school visit (St Johns Senior School, Kilkenny City) in December to explain the importance of proper waste segregation. Two similar talks are scheduled for January (Callan CBS & Windgap NS). These activities are linked with the objectives of the Regional Waste Management Plan (Policy Action B.2.3).

# Climate Change Education Series & Kilkenny County Council Supports Eco-Unesco Young Environmentalist Awards

Under the Community Environment Action Fund, 9 primary schools will receive a series of workshops to assist their understanding of climate change. Kilkenny County Council is supporting Eco-Unesco this year to promote their Young Environmentalist Awards programme locally to encourage more youth groups and schools to undertake environmental projects that positively contribute to their local environment. These activities are linked with the Council's Climate Change Adaptation Strategy (Action NBS 3.1).

# Ireland's Waste Action Plan for a Circular Economy Public Consultation

The Minister for Communications, Climate Action and Environment Richard Bruton T.D. announced the opening of a public consultation process on the development of Ireland's Waste Action Plan for a Circular Economy. The consultation process closes at 5pm on Friday 21st February next and can be accessed via https://www.dccae.gov.ie/en-

# County Kilkenny Green Charter for Community Festivals and Events

The Environment Section has developed a Green Charter for festivals and community events to encourage event organisers to minimise their environmental impact. This is considered the first step to encourage local communities to green their





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events. This initiative is supported by the Local Authority Prevention Network which is coordinated by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and is Action RM 10.1 of the Council's Climate Change Adaptation Strategy.

#### **PARKS**

#### Woodstock Gardens

The recent stormy weather has resulted in losses of some trees of significance from Woodstock Gardens. The age profile of the Victorian planting means the tree collection is more susceptible to winds and storms into the future. With this in mind Parks staff are embarking on a tree planting programme of specimen trees to ensure there will always be a stock of young trees developing for future generations to enjoy.



All funding has now been successfully drawn down on the Woodstock Loop Walks funded under the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme (ORIS). Another application for funding was made to the Department of Rural and Community Development to continue the trail development into a second phase further along the South Leinster Way, which would see the development of the walks as far as the Brownsford Stream Waterfall at the Red House. Funding of €17,634 has been awarded under the 2019 ORIS grant scheme to prepare a communications and marketing strategy for Woodstock Gardens in 2020. Funding of €14,000 was received from the Sports Capital Grant through the Department of Tourism, Transport and Sport for the development of a trim trail adjacent to the natural playground in Woodstock





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Enhancement works are currently taking place in the conservatory which houses the tea room while the facility is closed over the Winter months. The works involve lifting the stone floor which has always been problematic to keep clean in a food venue and also being hard to heat. This will be replaced instead with a tiled floor in the Victorian style. The stone floor will be re-used outside to create a terraced seating area overlooking the Terraced Flower Garden. The conservatory will also be painted and heating added to provide some comfort to customers helping to lengthen the period in which the tea rooms can remain open to the Winter months.







#### Ferrybank Neighbourhood Park

Work is well underway on the construction of the Ferrybank Neighbourhood Park. The path network is now in place along with the terraced area for the seating area and climbing wall being constructed currently. The playground equipment will be the last element to be added in the Spring with the aim to have the facility open for Easter 2020.

The construction of the park will create a much needed central amenity facility for Ferrybank, incorporating a children's playground, walking route, teenager meeting point, and playing pitch.

#### **Tree Planting**

The Parks Section has commenced a programme of tree planting in the City and County, which commenced last December to commemorate a number of special anniversaries. The planting programme is the beginning of our commitment to increase tree planting county wide to assist in addressing Climate Change. The trees will all be

native and/or pollinator friendly and will be semi mature at planting.

The anniversaries to be marked are as follows:

- 40 years of the Rotary Club. Forty trees now planted in Loughboy Neighbourhood Park.
- 30 years of the Kilkenny Civic Trust. 30 Trees now planted in Loughboy Neighbourhood Park.
- 20 years of Woodstock Gardens Restoration Project. 20 specimen trees being planted in the arboretum to replace storm losses from recent stormy periods.
- 25 Years of the Kilkenny Cat Laughs. 25 trees now planted in Lintown Hall to recreate the avenue of Lime trees which were previously vandalised.
- 120 years of Local Government with sites at Ballyragget, Castlecomer, Piltown, Callan and Kilkenny City.

#### Kilkenny Greenway

Works have commenced on the initial stages of the Kilkenny Greenway which runs from Ferrybank in Waterford to New Ross, terminating at Mount Elliot just after the tunnel is exited. The route covers a distance of c24km. To enable the detail design to be completed for the project the track has been cleared of scrub vegetation allowing access for the first time in years. Site surveys are now being carried out along with bore hole investigations at sites where accommodation works may be required for certain farming operations.

In tandem with this process a team from Wexford and Kilkenny County Council are meeting with landowners along the entire route to discuss accommodation works. Upon completion of this phase of works, the detailed design can be completed and the tender documents finalised. Contract documents must then be sent to the Department of Tourism Transport and Sport for approval following which the project will go to Public Tender for the construction phase. It is anticipated works will commence on site in mid 2020 with a completion date being set at December 2021.

#### **Amenity Grants**

Over 163 groups received grant assistance under the Amenity Grant Scheme in 2019 amounting to a total of €127k in funding. All applicants who submitted their claims in 2019 have been paid their grant. The Parks Department administers the amenity grants scheme, which is available to voluntary community organisations from all over the County. The main objective of the scheme is to encourage and aid small-scale works to improve the local environment and encourage community involvement in the upkeep and maintenance of public amenities. The range of works funded includes landscaping, grass and meadow maintenance and development of open spaces, the provision of street and outdoor furniture and small-scale improvement works. These works will help to continue to contribute to the overall amenity of County Kilkenny, and help enhance the County's reputation as a quality place to live. An increase in the total budget of €13k will bring the total fund up to €140k for 2020. increase in funding will further assist community groups in towns and villages maintain and upkeep their local neighbourhoods.

# Kilkenny City Allocated Significant Funding by Failte Ireland To Develop Tourism Potential

Kilkenny County Council has been allocated €500,000 as part of a €15.5million 'Destination Towns' initiative launched earlier this year by the National Tourism Development Authority, to be allocated in two rounds by Fáilte Ireland to boost the attractiveness and tourism appeal of towns nationwide.

The process of identifying the towns that receive funding commenced in mid-2019 and Kilkenny County Council has been successful in securing the allocation of significant funding which will be committed to improving the visitor journey in Kilkenny City.

A significant range of projects currently underway or moving to implementation include the Abbey Quarter, The Tholsel and Almshouses (adjacent to the Medieval Mile Museum), the Butler Gallery at Evan's Home- which includes a sculpture park and café, a new Tourist



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Information Office at High Street, Lighting the Medieval Mile. Kilkenny city's new public bus service is now a reality, and again the tourist needs have been included in the route selection and planning.

These projects will transform the visitor experience, deepen the engagement, and crucially – extend the centre of gravity from Kilkenny Castle to the Tholsel/ Medieval Mile Museum/Alms-houses-which will require improving the existing visitor flow by implementing an intuitive visitor focused orientation and way finding plan and improving the public realm, including:

- reviewing pedestrian crossing points, especially at the Parade/ Rose Inn Street/ High Street/ Patrick Street Junction.
- reviewing and rationalising existing orientation and directional signage.
- revising and rationalising existing mapping.

# Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme 2019 - Measure 1 Awards for Kilkenny

The Department of Community and Rural Development recently announced over €1.8 million in national funding for 109 projects under Measure 1 of the 2019 Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme.

The scheme is part of the Government's Project Ireland 2040 Rural Regeneration and Development programme, and provides funding for the development and maintenance of outdoor amenities such as trails, walkways, cycle ways and blueways. Kilkenny County Council secured €82,400 for five projects:

22 companies – 636 jobs – 981 prospective employees



Nine hundred and eighty-one prospective employees, home in Kilkenny for Christmas and those living locally, turned up to check out the jobs on offer at Kilkenny County Council's #careerskilkenny event. Such was the demand for jobs in the county that there was a queue to get in the door.

People from far and wide converged on the Medieval Mile Museum to attend #careerskilkenny, an event organised to highlight

636 high quality jobs on offer in 22 Kilkenny based companies.

Twenty-two of Kilkenny's biggest employers took part in the event which aimed to provide people home for Christmas with the opportunity to speak to Kilkenny employers who are seeking to fill a wide range of positions across a variety of sectors in 2020.

Companies taking part included State Street, The Taxback Group, Cartoon Saloon & Lighthouse Studios, VHI, Bank of Ireland, CF Pharma, Prochem Engineering, Irish Water, FRS Recruitment, Optimise Recruitment, Noel Lawler Consulting Engineers, Carne Group and the Asgard Group. They were joined by rapidly growing local companies such as the Modubuild, Beotanics, Loanitt, AB Agri, Entegro, Security Risk Advisors, CR Payroll and New Work Junction.

The companies were recruiting professionals and roles in customer care and sales, engineering, technical, financial, administration, network planners, technicians, HR, accounting, facilities and production.

Feedback to date has been hugely positive from both employers and prospective employees and a formal survey will follow up with both groups on the outcomes of same in February 2020.



#### **Private Grants**

Minister for Housing notified Kilkenny County Council that it's allocations for the three grants was €1,922,638 in 2019. Kilkenny County Council is required to fund €384,528 i.e. 20%.

The Council had advertised the 'Housing Aid for Older Persons Grant Scheme' for a restricted period in previous years but no restriction applies for 2020. The Council approved 393 private grants

The number of households in emergency accommodation (hotel/B&B) at year end was 6 of which 2 were children. The exit strategies for these households is HAP with Placefinder supports.

This reduction in homeless presentations from 2018 (6%) is as a result of the preventative measures and work done by the Homeless Team and the Placefinder role.


#### **New Rent Scheme and Rent Review 2020**

Members are reminded of the pending rent review to be carried out in early 2020 for all our tenants. It is hoped to have the new rents in place by April 2020.

Kilkenny County Council has harmonised both Rent schemes for 2020 to remove the current anomalies and inequity for current tenants in receipt of the same social welfare payments.

The main changes are:

- Minimum Rents Set at €28.00
- Single OAP in receipt of state pension calculated at minimum rent





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- Two OAP's in household each in receipt of state pension calculated at minimum rent subject to max rent of €45 (harmonisation clause)
- Non Return of rent forms: increase current weekly rent by €100 instead of 25% penalty

#### **Private Rented Inspections**

The Department has set a schedule of increasing targets up to 2021 so that there are on average 25% private properties inspected annually after 2021. The position to date is as follows:

- Tidy Estates competition Judging of the Kilkenny County Council 2019 Tidy Estates awards took place in August/early September. Announcements of the winners will be on the 30th of January 2020.

#### Refugee Resettlement Strategy

The Department of Justice and Equality notified Kilkenny County Council of its allocation to resettle 140 refugees into County Kilkenny in late 2017. The first Syrian families arrived in January The last family was resettled on 21st 2018. November 2019, In summary, there are 25 Syrian families resettled in eight (8) towns around Kilkenny, total of 141 individuals.

The current resettlement programme is now complete and this will remain in place until the end of March 2020. A Resettlement Worker and an Intercultural Worker supports the new families upon their arrival in Kilkenny.

#### **CLAR 2019**

The 2019 CLAR programme funded carpark surfacing for Tullogher Rosbercon GAA club, these works are now complete and the car park is operational.

#### Town & Village 2019

Funding agreements are now in place for the projects approved under the 2019 scheme, the projects will progress in early 2020.

#### **Rural Regeneration Fund (Call 2)**

In December, a second call (Call 2) for the Rural Regeneration Fund was announced and an application is presently being prepared for submission for the Friary building in Callan. Category 2 of the Rural Regeneration and supports Development Fund the early development of projects to enable them to reach a stage where the concept is developed to a high standard and the project is in a position to commence works

It ran throughout the month of December in all branches, with a range of family events held from



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





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#### **FINANCE REPORT – JANUARY 2020**

The expenditure by service division to the end of December is set out in table 1. Total Expenditure for the period was €86.9m compared with the annual budget of €79.7m.

Please note the actual figures for 2019 are draft only and are subject to change. The Annual Financial Statement for 2019 is currently being prepared and a draft will be presented at the March meeting.

The bank overdraft facility was utilized for ninety-six days in the twelve months to the end of December 2019. The maximum overdrawn balance was €5.7m. The closing cash balance on hand at the end of December 2019 was €9.5m.

The total non-mortgage loan balance outstanding as at December 2019 was €11.7m. The new loan finance of €10m approved by the Council; €5m in 2018 and €5m in 2019 will be drawn down during Quarter 1 2020 to fund the ongoing capital programme.

The final out turn on cash collections for 2019 is not available yet. It is expected that the results will be in line with previous years.
